As I write this I am excited for all of us because of what Easter promises us; we have a place to go. Thanks be to God.

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MISSION TO BATON ROUGE*

Our Mountain Valley Mission Community (MVMC) team of five left Winchester on March 4^{th} and returned March 11^{th} .

The primary purpose was to help re-build homes damaged by the extensive flooding last summer in and around Baton Rouge, LA. We worked on four homes, providing help with various carpentry, plumbing, and electric tasks. Meeting and hearing the stories of the homeowners was, as always, a highlight of our work trip.


We also moved one of two presbytery shower trailers from South Carolina to Baton Rouge. The trailer served about a year at a PDA Volunteer Village at Lake Murray PC for the flooding there in 2015. UPC is it's new home where it will provide service to the hundreds of volunteers coming to rebuild after the Baton Rouge flooding.

We assisted with the assessment of the damage to the Olive Tree Volunteer Village that was destroyed by recent tornados in New Orleans. That was the site where we stayed on work trips to New Orleans over the last five years.

We have grown a small, dedicated group of experienced disaster response workers in the Mountain Valley Missions Community (and beyond). We also have collected a list of recommendations for planning work trips that we can share with other potential trip leaders. This year's trip was jokingly billed as our sixth annual "last trip" to the Gulf Coast. We have moved on now from the Katrina recovery to other disasters that need attention. Although we are hoping to move our trips closer to home, the relationships built in the Golf Coast will keep drawing us back. Next year will likely be our second annual trip to South Louisiana.

ENDERS FIRE & RESCUE

Your service is needed in our community! A canteen of volunteers, when called upon, would provide food and beverages to the members of Enders Fire & Rescue and other first responders. This service is needed when the calls involve many hours. The canteen volunteers would be called in rotation and with enough volunteers you may only need to serve once a year.

A call from Dispatch would be made to one of the canteen organizers, who in turn would call two to three volunteers from a phone tree. As of now, the meeting place would be the Enders Fire Hall where items such as ice, water, Gatorade, and small snacks would be retrieved to take out to the scene of a call. Coolers, a folding table, chairs, and a tent would also be made available.

At the scene, we would set up and offer food and drink to all of the first responders. If the situation requires many hours then arrangements would be made for other food such as sandwiches, hamburgers, pizza, etc. to be picked up.

YOUTH GROUP NEWS

From Friday, March10th at noon to 6 p.m. Saturday, March 11th, 10 of our youth and 5 adults took part in the 30 Hour Famine. We fasted for 30 hours spending much of that time together in service to our community. Highlights of the event included an early morning (4:30 a.m.) visit to the Winchester Rescue Mission Shelter where we assisted with preparing breakfast and cleaning up around the shelter.

Later that afternoon after some rest time we spent two and a half hours in front of the Shop and Save asking shoppers to help us fight hunger in our community by donating nonperishable food staples for us deliver to the FISH Food Pantry. The people we met were tremendously generous and we brought back six shopping carts full of food back to the church, where it was placed in the sanctuary for Sunday morning worship. At 6 p.m. we broke our Fast with a communion service in the sanctuary followed by a delicious breakfast of soup and grilled cheese, along with Marna Swisher's world famous bacon wrapped tatter tots (oh they are so good.)

This is the 15th Famine we have participated in in as many years and in that time over \$30,000 has been raised to fight hunger around the world. The youth express their appreciation to the congregation for its continued support of this outreach.

Once a list of canteen volunteers is in place, there would be an organizational meeting with Chris Shipe and Jay Arnold from Enders Fire & Rescue. You would not be required to attend monthly meetings.

In 1814, Dolley Madison, the wife of President James Madison, introduced the most famous Easter egg roll, which still takes place annually on the White House south lawn.
