



Happy Easter:

As I got in the car and headed to Cleveland for my quick visit with Caitlin, I found myself thinking about next year's Holy week observances and Easter sermon. I didn't make a lot of progress but that is not the point, the point is that the planning process has already begun.

What the scriptures tell us is God himself started planning for the first Easter a few moments after the Fall. The words God spoke to Adam and Eve after they ate the fruit of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil are understood by many biblical scholars to point directly to the eventual coming of lesus and his sacrifice on the The point is Easter didn't just cross. happen, but rather our salvation is the result of God's intentional and purposeful planning.

We can and should take our lead from God here. Faithfulness and discipleship do not just happen but are the result of our intentional and purposeful efforts to grow and develop in these areas. This is true of us as individuals and it is true of us as a congregation. Over the years, we have grown and developed a great deal. There are many things that we are doing now that we were not doing 10 years ago, and there are some things that we were doing

10 years ago that we are not doing now. All this doing and not doing has been the result of intentional planning on the part of the Elders and Deacons who have served over these years and they have served us well.

Over the next few months our Long-Range Planning Committee wants to begin to look to the next 5 to 10 years as we consider not just the congregation that we are, but the one we are being called to become. What are we doing now that we want to keep doing? What are we doing now that is no longer working? What did we once do that we might want to do again? What are we not doing that we want to start doing? We have some answers to these questions but we really want to hear your answers to these and other similar questions. To help us we have crafted a survey that we are asking you to fill out so that we may clearly hear your voice as we consider the future of our congregation. You may respond to this survey either online (see p. 3) or by hard copy (insert) available in this newsletter. Each person in a household is encouraged to respond, and you do not have to be a member of the church! The important part is that you respond knowing that as you do you are helping to shape us into the congregation we will one day be, the congregation our creator God intends us to be.




In May and June our Service Committee has three ways for you to put your Easter faith into practice and help make a difference in our community.

Shanti Means Peace

At our monthly Circle meetings each member of our group faithfully contributes whatever pennies we may have to The Fellowship of the Least Coin. It wasn't until recently when I read a book about the founder, Shanti Solomon, that I became deeply moved by the realization of the significance of what our "least coins" actually make to this global prayer ministry. A total of \$261,800.00 was collected world-wide in 2016 to be used for grants in education and rehabilitation throughout the world by the International Committee of the Fellowship of the Least Coin (ICFLC). The Presbyterian Women in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) partner with this organization.

It was in 1956 when Christian women from around the world traveled together as the Pacific Mission team to Asia for peace and reconciliation following WWII. Dr. Margaret Shannon of the National Office of Presbyterian Women invited Shanti Solomon from Uttar Pradesh, India, to be part of this group. It was through Shanti's idea that "Everyone – old, young, rich or poor can pray for peace. And each time they prayed, they could give the least coin from their country to help someone in need. That was how the Fellowship of the Least Coin was born. Through this movement, Christian women around the world meet and pray for world peace and set aside their "least coins" of each currency so that even the poorest women can be part of this fellowship of love and care.

We all rejoice for this miracle prayer ministry started by Shanti Solomon and the working of the Holy Spirit.

Shanti Solomon with samples of the least coins collected by FLC.




Graduation Celebration: Join us Sunday May 21st as we celebrate the accomplishments of our High School Graduate,

TECHNOLOGY

Foster spiritual engagement with social media

Three of every four Internet-savvy adults have at least one social media profile, meaning they'll likely connect with your church online. So make sure those connections leave positive impressions

You don't need a large budget or a full-time media professional to create an effective social media presence for your church. It's as simple as translat-ing current ministries into an onlinefriendly format. And the potential goes beyond making people aware of

events and programming. Here are five ways to use social media to nurture people spiritually:

 Prayer requests. Set up a private, password-protected online group or prayer chain so people have a safe place to share. For especially sensitive matters, let people know they can remain anonymous (or use a pseudonym). They also can send a private message to the church's social media account so the request can be listed in very

general terms.

- 2. Sermon quotes. Superimpose a sentence or two from a recent sermon over an image, and share the post across the church's social media accounts. If possible, make the image square-shaped so it works on multiple feeds. Because viewers will likely share the post, include dates and times of worship services.
- Livestream portions of a service. Many social media accounts now allow for livestreaming, or broadcasting video in real time. Announce the broadcasts - such as sermons or prayer times -on social media beforehand. This will be especially meaningful for people unable to attend in person.
- 4. Missionary information. Keep missions on people's minds by posting information about specific projects or missionaries needing prayers and support. Many missionaries have social media accounts or websites you can link to. For safety's sake,

share details only with permission. Even then, list locations in geographically general terms.

5. Weekly devotionals. If a new sermon series or Bible study is launching, consider ways to trans late that information into engaging social media posts. Pose questions to get people's wheels spinning: for example, "What's one way someone showed you grace this week?" Moderate the comments to make sure people feel safe and welcomed.

If your church doesn't yet use social media, Facebook, Twitter and Instagram are great places to start. (See the Oct-ober 2016 "How-to" article, available at www.NewsletterNewsletter.com, for details.) As you're setting up the accounts, use the same name across every channel so people can easily find your church. N


