FROM BAGS TO BLESSINGS

Did you know plastic bags take decades to decompose in landfills? That's why a few of us ladies at church have found a way to turn those burdensome bags into blessings for homeless people.

We cut the shopping bags into two-inch strips, loop them together end to end and roll them into a ball— just like we'd do with a skein of yarn. With a big hook (size 10 or 11), we crochet the strips (using the basic single crochet stitch) into three-by six-foot sleeping mats.

The mats are sturdy and soft, and they don't hold moisture, making them an ideal barrier between a bedroll and the hard floor or ground. They're also easy to wash, and they dry quickly in the sun.

Besides being so practical, the mats are surprisingly eyecatching too. A ball of strips cut from yellow and orange newspaper sleeves, grocery bags with red and blue print, and department store bags in various colors combine to make a lively variegated pattern.

It feels good to help the environment and, at the same time, people in need.

Our October selection is The God of Small Things by Arundhati Roy

The beloved debut novel about an affluent Indian family forever changed by one fateful day in 1969. Compared favorably to the works of Faulkner and Dickens, Arundhati Roy's modern classic is equal parts powerful family saga, forbidden love story, and piercing political drama. The seven-year-old twins Estha and Rahel see their world shaken irrevocably by the arrival of their beautiful young cousin, Sophie. It is an event that will lead to an illicit liaison and tragedies accidental and intentional, exposing "big things [that] lurk unsaid" in a country drifting dangerously toward unrest. Lush, lyrical, and unnerving, The God of Small Things is an award-winning landmark that started for its author an esteemed career of fiction and political commentary that continues unabated.
