As a people of faith, our march through time can sometimes feel like that, a continual moving towards something

without knowing when we will reach the end. Jesus has told us there will be an end and that it will be good, but he also said only the Father knows the time, so we keep marching. We keep moving forward. I think God understands the effect that such a march can have on us so he gave us Advent, and so he gave us Lent. Our God gave us moments in the midst of the march in which we can renew our sense of purpose and be reminded of what we are marching towards. On the First of March we will enter the season of Lent, beginning our preparation for the observance of Holy Week and the celebration of Easter. In Lent, we pause in the marching to remember our need, because it was to meet that need that our Savior came. We pause to renew spiritual disciplines; praying a little more, reading a little more of the word, seeking to live out a little more of the word in acts of love and generosity. We pause to remember that it's not just a march that we are on, it is a journey, it is going somewhere, it is taking us somewhere. It is taking us to God. So let's keep marching, hoping, believing, loving and serving because that is what the

march is about.
